## **Assessment Outline**

This term you are deepening your understanding of how texts reflect the complex nature of human experiences. The syllabus rubric stipulates:

... students are to deepen their understanding of how texts represent individual and collective human experiences. They examine how texts represent human qualities and emotions associated with, or arising from, these experiences. Students appreciate, explore, interpret, analyse and evaluate the ways language is used to shape these representations in a range of texts in a variety of forms, modes and media. Students explore how texts may give insight into the anomalies, paradoxes and inconsistencies in human behaviour and motivations, inviting the responder to see the world differently, to challenge assumptions, ignite new ideas or reflect personally...

This task will allow you to demonstrate your understanding of the ways **your prescribed text** <u>Go Back to Where</u> <u>You Came From</u> directed by Ivan O'Mahoney **and one related text of your choice** represent the value of texts in shaping your views about human experiences.

### Your task: TED Talk

You have been invited to **speak at a TED Ed convention** in which guest presenters will explore their **understanding of the value of texts in shaping an understanding about human experiences**. Speakers will present their insights about **how their chosen texts have inspired the speaker to reflect personally on how they see the world**. The theme of the convention is:

'Revisiting human experiences allows our attitudes to be transformed.'

Your presentation will engage a contemporary audience who is interested in academic analysis of texts and how media inspires audience responses.

### Your TED Ed talk should:

- reflect an authentic host style which is engaging, thought-provoking and insightful
- be between the **7 8 minutes** time requirement (approx. 650- 750 words)
- include a slide set of visuals (may include up to 100 words total) to complement your talk
- be informed by your in-class study and independent research and examination of the selected texts
- demonstrate thoughtful analysis of key scenes with consideration of literary devices and film techniques including language, structure and form
- include a clear introduction, thesis, clear analysis of supporting evidence, and a conclusion
- be recorded (voice and visuals); you may use Screencastify or similar apps

TASK PREPARATION					
To prepare for the presentation:					
Watch the prescribed text Go Back To Where You Came From and complete the in-class activities. Refer to your episode booklets for additional notes. Select relevant scenes from the whole series to form the basis					
of your presentation and thesis ideas.					
Choose ONE related text of your choice. This must be a different text type to your prescribed text.					
Familiarise yourself with the plot, setting, characters, themes and narrative point of view.					
Examine the use of language and film techniques in your prescribed text.					
Develop possible ideas that work within the context of the texts and the task instructions.					
Identify and analyse key language and stylistic devices; review your knowledge and application of language and film techniques, imagery, dialogue, punctuation and narrative structure.					
Understand the concept of a multimodal presentation; research, select and collate visuals to complement your script.					
Research and view other TED Talks as models for your own presentation. TED Talks follow a specific brief

Draft a script for your TED Talk and think of suitable images that may complement your talk.					
<b>*DRAFT SUBMISSION:</b> draft script and storyboard of visuals <b>due via Google Classroom at 3.30pm on Friday 8th</b> <b>December 2023 (Week 9)</b> . Feedback will be provided to students in the double-period on Tuesday Week 10.					
Edit, refine and polish your Ted Talk script. Your visuals may be collated on Slides, Canva or other suitable application.					
Practise your TED Talk to familiarise yourself with your script and refine your presentation. Images should be shown with the voiceover of your TED Talk.					
To record your presentation, you may use Screencastify, iMovie, PowerPoint or other relevant apps. Apply engaging voice, expression, tone, pitch and volume, speed and pauses to suit your speaking style.					
Periodically save versions of your TED Talk to prevent loss on account of technology failure.					
Save your TED Talk as a MPEG4 file onto a USB <b>before</b> the due date as there will be no extensions granted for last minute technology issues.					
Test your audio file on a different device and save as a mp4 file in Google Drive.					
Upload and submit your Ted Talk episode to Google Classroom Submissions Portal by 3.30pm					

### Non-completion of Task:

If you know you are going to be away on the day that the task is due, you must make alternative arrangements with your teacher beforehand. If you are suddenly away on the day that the task is due, you must contact your teacher or Head Teacher on your return to school. Documentation will be required in both cases.
