Assessment Outline

Students will demonstrate their understanding of <u>one significant social media issue</u> by creating an <u>informative or</u> <u>persuasive blog post with accompanying visuals</u> to explore this idea.

The <u>blog post should be between 200-400 words</u>, and highlight the impact social media has on teenagers today. It must <u>include at least one image</u> that supports the main idea explored in the post. It must also <u>include data-driven</u> <u>evidence</u> to support the points you are making.

Students will then write a short <u>reflection, of 150 words</u>, explaining why they chose to explore this idea and the research they undertook. Students should analyse and explain one appropriate language technique they used to communicate in an informative or persuasive fashion to their readers.

Blog posts should be printed out and handed in to your class room teacher, or submitted in google classroom by the due date above.

NOTE: Class time will be allocated to working on the research and campaign design aspects of this task.

Non-completion of Task:
