# TASK REQUIREMENTS

# You are required to attempt the following:

Based on coursework performed in class and further research, <u>prepare HSC-style extended responses</u> on the Family Option. ONE response should be connected to the following *Theme & Challenge* and ONE should be connected to the following *Contemporary Issue*:

- Theme & Challenge: The role of the law in encouraging cooperation and resolving conflict in regard to family
- Contemporary Issue: The changing nature of parental responsibility

You are required to answer ONE Family Extended Response Question that is related to EITHER the above *Theme and Challenge* OR *Contemporary Issue*.

You will have had the opportunity to research the topic areas and prepare potential draft responses. This **task will be marked out of 25**. Your teacher will advise you of the contribution of this task to your overall school assessment in this subject.

On the day of completing the task at school, you will have 1 lesson (50 minutes approx.) to complete your final written response. No material (e.g. drafts, summary notes) is to be brought into this lesson.

Your teacher will advise you of any variation to these conditions.

Additional advice:

#### Ensure your response:

- includes reference to legislation, cases and media articles (LCMs);
- refers to a variety of legal mechanisms: Family Court, Family Dispute Resolution, Family Relationship Centres
- has a logical and cohesive structure, including a brief conclusion
- is approximately 1000-1200 words in length. This helps to ensure enough detail is present inside your response and that it meets the NESA suggested length.

#### Rubric

In your answer you will be assessed on how well you:

- demonstrate knowledge and understanding of legal issues relevant to the question;
- communicate using relevant legal terminology and concepts;
- refer to relevant examples such as legislation, cases, media, international instruments and documents;
- present a sustained, logical and cohesive response.

## **Task Preparation**

You are able to plan and research the TWO Family Law Question Areas over a two-week period before completing a specific question in an assigned lesson.

You are encouraged to liaise with your teacher in the preparation phase.
