- Varicella and HPV (girls only) immunizations happened last week. If your son or daughter missed their shots due to absence, the community nurses will catch them up at the next scheduled installment on 4th August. As we were the last Orange school to receive the vaccinations this time around, there was no opportunity for absent students to visit another school for the needles.
- Back in 2002, when our current Anti-bullying Policy had been written, cyber-bullying hadn't been heard of too much. Today, in light of escalating reports of bullying through electronic media, we need to re-write our Policy. As part of an awareness and prevention program prior to the re-write, the Cybersmart Outreach Section of the Australian Communications and Media Authority will be at Orange High School next week, on Tuesday, 14th June. This group is highly sought

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after and we are indeed very fortunate to have secured their services as they rarely operate outside the major cities. All Year 7 to 10 students will participate in a presentation to be held in the afternoon of 14th June. At 3.45p.m. a session designed for teachers will be conducted. Teachers from the local schools are invited to attend. Finally, at 6.15p.m. there is a special presentation for parents which will assist them in the awareness of cyberbullying and provide strategies to help their children deal with the pressures of online technologies. Staff and parents are asked to indicate their attendance for catering purposes. More information is available on our website.

- *Techno-Bully* is a professional performance put on by Starrs' Productions and deals with the problem of how bullying occurs over the internet. The actors demonstrate the feelings generated by such conduct and give strategies to assist in ending harassment. It is both funny and entertaining but has a serious side as well. Welfare part funds this performance as we consider it an important follow-on from the cyberbullying workshops.

- Teenage sibling fighting By Raising Children Network

It's normal for teenage siblings to fight over all sorts of things. But handled the right way, sibling conflict can help children learn important life skills, such as how to solve problems and treat others with empathy. Suggestions for handling fights between teenage siblings:

Avoid solving the problem for your children – get them to listen to each other's perspective first.

Coach them through conflict.

Motivate them to resolve fights themselves.

Keep track of how the fights get resolved to ensure one child isn't dominating the other.

Look at what the conflict is about, rather than focusing on who started it.
