- The ARCHER study hangs in the balance. This study is a longitudinal study which aims to investigate the role of hormones and the effect on the behaviour, physical and mental wellbeing of rural Australian teenagers. The team from the University of Sydney were hoping for 100 students to volunteer to take part in this world-first study, but only nine consent forms have been returned. An information night for parents and students was held last night, but if you feel that you son or daughter could take part, then please contact me at school ASAP.
