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As we enter into the second week of the HSC I have been discussing exams with Year 12 students. Most students that I have spoken to seemed positive about their exam and with the effort they have been able to put into studying. This is a timely reminder for our Year 11 students who have just started the HSC course to start preparing now. Some students have already taken some initial steps to cut back on part time work, limit social time and cut back on other interests to put more time into study. These adjustments to a student studying the HSC can increase the likelihood of achieving a desired result. Having said that, some students may become overwhelmed with the prospect of the HSC and it is important that if this happens someone at school knows this so that the appropriate support can be given to our senior students. A 10% on top teacher, year advisor, deputy principal, school counsellor or HT Welfare are all appropriate support people that can be contacted if this occurs.

Year 9 and 10 were given their exam timetables this week and we hope that by formalising these exams that students will be motivated to revise work and take their yearly exams seriously. It is hoped that a positive culture can be developed in our Stage 5 students so that when these students enter Year 11 exam technique and study have already been established.

Mr Baker asked me on Tuesday to visit our students that are participating in the Premiers Sporting Challenge. They were working with students from the special schools around the area at Anson Street. When I arrived I was impressed with the leadership skills all of these students were demonstrating, they were really getting involved and managed to motivate and lead students with special needs through a series of fun and challenging activities. Mr Baker should be congratulated for the passion that he has for this program and I am sure that experiences such as this contribute to some of the reasons why students from Orange High School turn into great citizens.

This was an opportunity that was too good to refuse. With many of our year groups currently studying Shakespeare, watching the play may help develop greater understanding.

Not an afternoon goes by where I don't see a group practising or rehearsing and working hard under the watchful eyes of staff. It is important for students to challenge themselves with these experiences. It is through these experiences that students learn the value of teamwork and goal setting and I would like to acknowledge all of the staff who give so freely of their time to nurture these talents. Thanks to all of the parents who provide transport and financial support, these activities are a welcome break away from electronic media and are often the things most remembered by students about their school days.

- ◆ Rotary Youth Driver Awareness program is on TODAY.
