Morning tea was followed by a meeting with members of Orange High School's Leadership Team during which the group outlined our future plans and directions incorporating the increased funding under the Department's new Resource Allocation Model (RAM). 
FACULTY NEWS – ENGLISH

It is difficult to believe that we are half way through the final semester of the year and there is still have so much leaning to be done! All of the junior years have completed end of course examinations and I must commend all of the students for their conscientious approach to the completion of the exams. The English staff are busy marking papers and will present comprehensive feedback to your students with future directions for their learning.

In the second half of this term students will be busily engaged in a range of activities. Year 7 students are being introduced to the world of Drama and will be developing skills in areas such as improvisation. They will also look at scripts and performance skills. This can often be challenging for some students but English classrooms are supportive environments and all students are encouraged to participate. Year 8 have finished exploring Shakespeare and his times and will now complete a unit developing their short story writing skills. This is an important text type that is assessable throughout their entire English studies. Year 9 are deconstructing film as a form of communication and they will have the opportunity to use their technology skills to create a film or a film trailer. Year 10 classes are studying different concepts ranging from "Protest Songs and Poetry" to "Change". They are developing their skills in deconstructing texts in the lead up to their transition into senior English.

Last term I reported on the submission of the HSC Extension Two Major Works and as I am writing this, I am currently working with six new candidates for the course. We had the opportunity to attend a course co-ordinated by the State Library of New South Wales where the students were able to speak to experienced Extension Two markers about the best way to approach the project. Students were able to "speed date" an expert, including Dr Felicity Plunkett who, as well as being an author, was the Chief Examiner of Extension One and Two English between 2004 and 2009. This experience was invaluable for the 2014 students and they are all eagerly researching their concepts as well as their form in the preparation for the commencement of the actual writing process.

Our new group of Higher School Certificate candidates have been busily developing their understanding of the Area of Study, Belonging. They have been exploring this complex concept and studying prescribed texts such as *The Simple Gift* and Shakespeare's *As You Like It*. In week 9 of this term, students have their first HSC assessment task due where they have to compose and present a five minute speech where they deconstruct two additional texts that they have researched. Although this is a daunting task, the students learn a great deal and develop confidence in public speaking which is a vital skill.

The English faculty are also busily putting the final touches on the new and innovative programs for the implementation of the National Curriculum for Years 7 and 9 in 2014. These exciting new units are designed to challenge students and meet the needs of twenty-first century learners. It has been a great deal of work for the faculty and we are eagerly awaiting the challenge of teaching these innovative new program.
