PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Returning from Maternity leave is Rachel Crane in the Creative and Performing Arts. **There is no doubt the strength of Orange High is the incredibly talented team of teachers who comprise the school and it is exciting to welcome new teachers into a future focused and innovative atmosphere.**

Particular congratulations must go to Mrs Kylie Winslade who has been appointed following a Merit Selection Process as our Substantive Head Teacher Administration/Students. As is well known by staff, students and parents alike, Mrs Winslade is an incredibly talented teacher and leader and I am so pleased she is now a permanent part of our substantive Leadership Team.

Last term concluded on an absolute high with the outstanding student performances in the School Show and the convincing victory in the Astley Cup win breaking a seven year drought.

Judging from recent phone calls and emails, many of you, like myself, have been disillusioned, dismayed and downright disgusted by the recent exaggerated and sensationalised negative media surrounding Orange High School's Astley Cup win by Prime TV, the Central Western Daily and affiliated papers in Dubbo and Bathurst. As an educator I will never justify any form of violence as acceptable, however the footage of the incident was cut, extended, exaggerated, repeated and as a result blown out of proportion, souring an otherwise exemplary and historic Astley Cup success. As a result the media has provoked a passionate and spirited response and defence from students, staff, parents and the wider Orange community.

People, interestingly students in particular, are concerned that as a result of the seemingly relentless negative media, some of the wider Orange Community could be forgiven for developing an incorrect perception that Orange High School is a violent school. Nothing could be further from the truth and in fact there is a strong belief and acknowledgment across the school by, students, staff and parents that the opposite is indeed factual. Further, this understanding is strongly supported by statistical evidence. As a result I would like to share with you data that verifies the continually improving learning environment at Orange High School.

- During Term 2, 2014, there were **no** incidents and as a result **no** suspensions for fighting or violence with the exception of what amounted to a 'scuffle' between a couple of our junior high students who are still developing social skills.
- There was a documented 44% reduction in the number of negative incidents recorded in Term 2, 2014 compared to data from Term 2, 2013. Even more dramatic was a 74% reduction in reported incidents in Term 1, 2014 compared with data from Term 1, 2013. If data is compared back to 2012 and previous years the positive culture change as evidenced by the data is even more stunning.
- Year to date (end of Term 2, 2014) Orange High's attendance statistic across the school was 90.84% (significantly above the state average for high schools) compared to 90.42% in 2013. This compares to 86.3% four years ago in 2010.

The stirring win in the Astley Cup where the Orange High School teams convincingly won 14 of the 16 events was the result of a resurgent school spirit. Nothing can take away from the fact that almost every one of the hundreds of students in the 16 events displayed impeccable sportsmanship and sense of fair play. Anyone who witnessed first-hand the palpable school pride displayed by our students and staff could not have helped but be moved by the determination passion and pride carried by every student. Each student played with the OHS crest adorned on their chest and personally exemplified the school motto 'Quod Potero Sedulo' – whatever I do, I do it to the best of my ability.

Semester One 2014 didn't just see success on the sporting field but rather a strengthening of the positive culture exemplified by significantly higher numbers of students with gold and silver awards on their reports as well as success in external competitions against other schools rarely seen or experienced in the school's 100 Year History. Additionally the six sessions of the 'Orange High School Show' at the end of last term was a very public and tangible reminder of the incredible student talent under development at the school. The dedication of staff and students alike ensures the continued development of an Orange High School culture in which *every* student has the opportunity to not only develop and display their talent, but further and most importantly to find and be accepted for whom they are as an individual.

These measurable successes are the result of hard work form a talented and committed teaching and leadership team who support and cultivate more than 1000 of the most amazing young people in Australia today.

Over the next semester and beyond, I look forward to leading a positive and future focused school buoyed by the many and various successes of Semester One 2014 that continue to cultivate excellence, respect, fairness and a strong sense of self-identify in every one of our students. What really matters is learning excellence while nurturing and caring for the young people entrusted to us. Every one of our students, including those who make mistakes, will be supported in their growth and development maximised by the continued establishment of a strong sense of school purpose in a 'high value' environment that resonates with adults and young people alike.

DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Welcome to Term Three and what a cool start to the term we have had. During the next two months we will probably experience some severe weather conditions that will include sleet, rain and snow. Students will be allowed to go to the Performing Arts Centre or the Gymnasium at recess and lunch when the conditions are poor.

Term Three is Year 12's final term and many Year 12 students and their parents start to anticipate the completion of 13 years of schooling. For many it is an exciting time but for others there will be some trepidation leading up to the Higher School Certificate. It is important at this time for students and parents who are experiencing difficulties to discuss their issues with the support network that is available to them at Orange High School. The Year Adviser Ms Rogers is a good starting point or for careers advice or questions about University entry. Ms Hope is another informed person to seek out at this time. Our School Counsellors, Ms Pilon and Mrs Flood, are also available for students to make appointments with if they feel they need additional support.

Mrs Hamilton and I are also available to discuss concerns leading up to the HSC with parents and students. If you would like an appointment with any of the people mentioned above please make contact with the school on 6362 3444 so that an appropriate time can be organised or, if you would like to simply discuss a situation on the phone that is also an option.

There is also Homework Centre on Wednesdays and Thursdays to support the learning of students in all years and I encourage students who are having difficulty with tasks to attend these afternoons as staff are on hand to assist students with assessments and to study. Some students simply enjoy the quiet learning environment. Afternoon tea is provided and the Library is open until 5 00pm.

There are several events planned for this term including the Year 7 "Aussie Bush Camps" Excursion as well as the Year 9 and 10 Sports Studies Excursion. Students are excited about these upcoming excursions and it is timely to remind parents and students that their behaviour needs to remain acceptable for them to attend any excursion. Students on levels will not be permitted to attend these excursions. Students who are not attending excursions still need to attend school as regular classes will be operating.

Year 10 have a Subject Selection Information Night on Monday, 21st July in the Performing Arts Centre. It is important that students and parents take this opportunity to help them make an informed decision. Head Teachers from various faculty areas will be available and they are the best people to discuss the appropriateness of a subject for your child.

Parents of Year 8 students will also have an Information Night on the 4th August in the Performing Arts Centre to discuss electives for the Record of School Achievement (RoSA) in 2015. Again this is a useful evening to find out more about the extensive subjects offered at Orange High School
