Principal's Report

Congratulations to students in Year 7 and 9 who sat the NAPLAN assessments this week. Staff supervising were very impressed with the positive attitude of students throughout what can be a gruelling 3 days of assessments for some students. It is important to keep the assessments in perspective; that is that they are essentially one form of assessment completed at one time in the year. Our strong view as a school, is that while the results do provide data to teachers, students are far more than a number assigned at the end of a test. There are many reasons why students may or may not have not have performed as expected on the day. So long as this perspective is maintained, and student wellbeing and overall confidence is the overriding principle, the assessments are a valuable tool to support future achievement for the young people who sit them.

Senior students Sophie Tonkin and Logan Cotter spoke with maturity and sincerity at the funeral for former student Lochie Connaughton earlier this week. Their powerful and heartfelt words were spoken with strength and courage reflecting the strong connections between Lochie and his peers. As a school, we will continue to support senior students as they return from the examination period to regular school routines.

Congratulations to our Junior Boys Soccer Team who defeated Bathurst High earlier this week in difficult wet and cold conditions on our back oval. The game could have gone either way but thanks to an early goal in extra time Orange High won through. Congratulations in particular to Cal Dixon who scored all 6 of our goals and Jordan Bruce who did an inspiring job as goal keeper saving numerous chances.
