Story from Former OHS Student Josh Farr

"The Four Seasons of Life after High School"

In 2009, I graduated from Orange High School as the Vice-Captain and with an ATAR that would allow me to get into a university of my choice. I had been taught by a handful of exceptional teachers and as Newton said in 1676, "If I have seen further, it is by standing on the shoulders of giants."

Fortunately, I received two scholarships allowing me to attend The University of New South Wales in Sydney where I would complete 1st Class Honors Degree in Civil Engineering. I moved into Basser College on campus, following a former OHS School Captain and in my second year, coordinated the College Ball fundraising approx. \$24,000 using my bedroom. Stepping up from here, I was able to become President of the Civil & Environmental Engineering Society and work with a team of 10 to co-ordinate 1500 students and a \$150k budget before I graduated. I was jumping through all the hoops I thought I should.

After university, I entered season number two - the real world. Moving on from my 'casual' 36hr/week job that I worked for the last 6 months of my study, I took on a full-time Graduate Engineering role on the Barangaroo Precinct in Sydney. I was learning every day but quickly realised that the industry, while flooded with cash, was ridden with physical, emotional and mental health problems. On top of that, I didn't want to spend my life making rich people richer in the corporate world. I decided to see the year out, completing my Graduate Program in record time, but decided to leave and do something I first got a taste for after visiting Japan as an OHS student - travel the world!

The upside of working my backside off was that I'd saved a few dollars - but that ran out quickly! Season number three of life after school consisted of bunk beds in hostels, working for between \$2-\$9/hour and backpacking around the world for 2 years. Accompanied by my best friend from OHS, Mr Cody Searl, we saw 39 countries on 5 different continents. We had arguably too much fun, worked a lot of weird jobs including cocktail bartending in Canada, running tours in London and changing bedsheets in Portugal and Spain, but by far my most notable and life changing experience was when I volunteered at a Syrian refugee border crossing between Macedonia and Serbia. The short time there helping over 6,000 people keep warm, eat and cross the border safely inspired me to spend the next chapter of my life working towards improving the lives of as many people as possible. I'd spent my travels so far learning to snowboard, accumulating Instagram followers and achieving a readership of tens of thousands of people on Trip Advisor, but it failed in comparison to the feeling of fulfilment by helping another person, and it didn't matter that we didn't speak the same language, have the same skin colour or believe in the same Gods.

The most recent season number four after high school involved moving back to Australia to live in Melbourne and work full-time for the #1 Not-For-Profit Graduate Employer in the country - Teach For Australia as the Victorian Recruitment Manager. The years of travel and a renewed love for reading taught me the difference between mastering achievement versus finding true fulfilment. So in 2017, feeling more energised than ever, I am treating this chapter of my life as an experiment to see how many interesting and rewarding projects I can contribute towards to help as many people as possible. Outside of my full-time job, I've coordinated a team of 20 (including several former OHS students - Grant Turner, Olivia Lambert and my dear friend Cody) as we fundraised over \$11,000 providing 215 scholarships for girls in rural Cambodia to go to school in 2018. I also work for TEDxMelbourne as the Partnerships Executive and have recently started working with an organisation called Boundless, designing workplace experiences for Year 10 students from regional areas of Victoria.

I am thankful for everything that the staff and students at OHS helped me learn and can't wait to visit OHS on June 29th to speak with Year 12 students about some of the mistakes I made and lessons I learned along the way.
