We welcome the stories from past competitors. This issue's memory was contributed by Graeme (Tub) Taylor, who represented OHS in rugby league in 1959-1960. Graeme played hooker (now no. 9) in 1959-60, lock & captain in 1961.

"The Astley & Mulvey Cup competitions were the most anticipated events on the school calendar in those days. Prior to the events, telegrams (no internet in those days!) from former students, urging victory, would be placed on the school notice board. Trips to Bathurst & Dubbo were mostly by steam train, providing the perfect opportunity for students to initiate or strengthen their relationships - all under the watchful eye of the accompanying teachers. The train would be met by equally excited host school students, and participants would be matched up with a billet for the next two nights. The Mulvey Cup debate was held the first night, whilst the sporting events were played out over the next couple of days". ....to be continued....

### From the Principal

Dear parents and members of our school community,

These outstanding professionals join the ever-increasing group of teachers whose focus is the wellbeing of students and staff at OHS.

Years 7 and 9 have begun their weekly wellbeing lessons with their Year Advisors, through which they are engaging with The Resilience Project. Year 8 are preparing to participate in one of the biggest longitudinal studies around mental health in teens through the Black Dog Institute. Year 10 participated in the Love Bites program in Week 5, learning about respectful relationships from professionals in the fields of housing, health and policing. All juniors have had the opportunity to hear from our Police Liaison Officer, Jane Heffernan, about issues specific to their stages. In addition, the speakers from Digital Thumbprint have worked with students in years 7-10 this week to explore the implications of their online activity. Our senior students have been supported to maximise their success in their learning throughout their Preliminary and HSC courses.

Supplementing these initiatives are ongoing small group workshops and activities run by our amazing Hub Coordinator, Mrs Philpott, and Student Support Officer, Miss Cumberland. OCTEC are offering places on the Shed Ed and Aspire programs for selected students and senior students are encouraged to take part in the peer mentoring training to help support our younger students.

Students are encouraged to speak to their Year Advisors or Head Teachers of Wellbeing, Mrs Philpott or Miss Cumberland if they are interested in any wellbeing programs or activities.

We look forward to continuing to build the capacity of our students to practice self-care and stay well physically and emotionally throughout 2021, and stay tuned for the many exciting programs and events coming soon!



### YEAR 12 GEOGRAPHY

Year 12 Geography spent all of last week in Shellharbour studying ecosystems at risk and urban dynamics. The school worked with the Illawarra Education Centre to run the field work programs.

The students started their week by collecting primary fieldwork data in the Littoral Rainforest in Minnamurra, this will be their focus in their HSC exam. The following day students undertook a transect study of rock platforms followed by an afternoon of snorkelling at Bushrangers Bay where they swam with sharks, stingrays, and many species of fish. The students also got introduced to their next topic which looks at the reusing of spaces, run by Mr Bonin. Big thanks to the students, Miss Wright and Mr Bonin for making the week so amazing!































### **YEAR 10 MARINE STUDIES**

Year 10 Marine Studies have been working hard practicing their bandaging techniques this week.

Covering a break in the skin helps to control bleeding and protect against infection. Dressings are pads of gauze or cloth that can be placed directly against the wound to absorb blood and other fluids.

Cloth bandages cover dressings and hold them in place.

### **SCIENCE NEWS**

Students have been getting hands on with their learning in Science this term.

Year 7 have started off the year learning how to use Bunsen burners, and are now exploring solids, liquids and gases in Chemistry. Ms Huggett's class (pictured) have been using indicators in acids and bases to make a rainbow of chemicals.

However, it isn't just Year 7 who are being hands-on with their learning. Year 8 Science are looking at the systems of the human body by completing some dissections! Mr Routh and Miss Constant's 8TDP Science class (pictured) dissected a chicken wing in the Science labs so that they could look at the connection between the skeletal and muscular systems. Next up is the circulatory system!

It's all things go in the senior classes as well, with our Year 11's diving into their new Science subjects. In Biology, students are learning all about cells, including how they get the nutrients they need to survive. All classes have completed a "diffusion investigation" (pictured) where they see how concentration can affect the movement of materials through the cell membrane.

Mr Tom O'Connor has also joined the OHS Science faculty this year. Mr O'Connor was previously at Kogarah High School in Sydney. We are all excited to see what exciting activities he will bring with him to Orange High School.

That's is from Science for now - we're off to conduct some more exciting investigations!




















### YEAR 11 GEOGRAPHY


### HIVE

Below is a glimpse into the fabulous achievements of our busy bees so far!











### YEAR 11 EXPLORING EARLY CHILDHOOD



The P&C provides an opportunity for you to participate in your child's education. Regular information sessions are held to keep you informed about the changes in education curriculum and policy.



## **E-Cigarettes**





#### **WHAT ARE E-CIGARETTES?**

Also known as cuvies, stigs and vapes an e-cigarette is in simple terms a device that heats a flavoured liquid (popular flavours include; strawberry, watermelon, peach and creme brulee) to an aerosol which can be inhaled. The device can be disposable (often allowing for up to 600 inhalations) or it can be reusable by refilling the device with e-liquid or a pod (containing e-liquid). Recent data shows an increase in use of e-cigarettes over the past three years, with one in five students aged 16–17, trying e-cigarettes.

#### **HOW DO THEY WORK?**

E-cigarettes produce an aerosol by using a battery to heat a liquid. This liquid is sometimes called "e-juice," "e-liquid," "vape juice," or "vape liquid." The liquid used in e-cigarettes is made up of flavours, chemicals and often contains nicotine.

Users inhale e-cigarette aerosol into their lungs. Bystanders can also breathe in this aerosol when the user exhales it into the air.

#### WHAT DO THEY LOOK LIKE?

E-cigarettes come in a variety of shapes and sizes. They can be as small as a USB and even look like one, they can also look like pens, highlighters or cigarettes.



### WHY ARE THEY UNSAFE/RISKY/DANGEROUS?

E-cigarette liquid is made up of different chemicals. These chemicals can include:

- · Nicotine (although illegal without a prescription in Australia, many disposable devices that youth are using contain nicotine.)
- · Flavorings such as diacetyl, a chemical linked to a serious lung disease
- Volatile organic compounds
- · Cancer-causing chemicals
- · Heavy metals such as nickel, tin, and lead

Studies have also shown that kids who use e-cigarettes are more likely than their peers to go on to smoke cigarettes.

#### Effects of nicotine on youth:

- Nicotine can harm the developing teenage brain. The brain keeps developing until about age 25.
- · Using nicotine as a teenager can harm the parts of the brain that control attention, learning, mood, and impulse control.
- Each time a new memory is created or a new skill is learned, stronger connections or synapses are built between brain cells. Young people's brains build synapses faster than adult brains. Nicotine changes the way these synapses are formed.
- Using nicotine as a teenager may also increase risk for future addiction to other drugs.1

### WHAT CAN I DO AS A PARENT?

The KEY is talking about e-cigarettes with your child, preparing yourself with the facts and role modelling with a smoke and e-cigarette free environment. KEY considerations for talking about e-cigarettes:

K: Know the facts or where to find them from a reputable source

- **E:** Engage on the topic in a relaxed and easy way. Use the cues around you, a note home from the school, a person using a device, a story on the news as the way into the conversation and the way to keep talking about it ongoing.
- Y: You know your child, communicate with them in ways that work for you and allow you to provide them with the right information to make healthy decisions.

Important note - if you are concerned that your child may be experiencing nicotine withdrawal please speak to your pediatrician or doctor.
