### THE BUZZ—WELLBEING

Term 2 at Orange High School has been jam-packed with activities and events aimed at enhancing the overall wellbeing of our students. The Orange High School family came together for our very first Wellbeing Week which featured high-impact, inspiring presentations from Martin at The Resilience Project. Martin talked to students, parents and carers, as well as staff about the Importance of gratitude, empathy and mindfulness in our everyday lives, and how these three values can contribute to positive mental health. As part of this exciting week, we had visitors from the Black Dog Institute who kick-started our participation in the Future Proofing longitudinal study into adolescent mental health, and facilitators from Tomorrow Man and Tomorrow Woman who worked with Year 10 students to challenge damaging gender stereotypes. The week was a fantastic opportunity for the Orange High School community to focus on the factors that influence our ability to engage in our core business, which is learning.

Throughout the term, students have continued to make the most of the wonderful programs that we have available to enhance student wellbeing. The ShedEd and Aspire programs run by OCTEC have been successful in engaging some of our Year 8 and 9 students with learning outside of the classroom. Nat, our awesome SSO, has been working with small groups of students to complete the Optimal Health Program, The Resilience Project, and Peer Mentoring, and she has big plans for further opportunities in the second half of the year. Our Hub Coordinator, Mrs Philpott, has worked with Year 12 students to manage their many commitments and refine their study skills as they undertake their HSC, and provides a welcoming environment in our Hub space for all students. Nat and Mrs Philpott are incredible supports for our students and we are so lucky to have them.

Each year group had the opportunity in Week 6 to come together for a year assembly run by their Year Advisors. These assemblies continue to provide the Wellbeing Team with a great platform from which to communicate important messages to their year groups and focus on issues most pertinent to their cohorts. The students were surprised to have a guest appearance from Martin who reminded us of the GEM principles. In the whole school assemblies throughout the term, we have pitted the year groups against each other in the great year group challenges, which have involved footy passing, guess the smile and juggling. Year 7, 11 and 12 have all had wins so far, and competition is heating up leading into Christmas in July (actually June) celebrations in Week 10. May the best year win!

After a busy and fruitful Semester One, we are excited by the momentum created behind the promotion of positive wellbeing for our students. Students, parents and carers are encouraged to continue to reach out for support where necessary to ensure that all students are in the best position to learn at OHS. They are a great way to build deeper connections as your family shares a meal either in the morning, afternoon or evening or at a time that works best.

Hear are some great GEM CHAT questions and ideas to get you started;

- Remember someone who has done something kind for you recently. What did they
  do for you? How did this make you feel?
- What is your perspective? Can you put yourself in someone else's shoes and understand their point of view?
- Who is someone you know who may be experiencing some difficulty currently? What could we do for them as a family?
- What is something kind you are going to do for someone today?

### FOOTBALL ASTLEY CUP

Orange League's Query

The Orange Rugby League, in a letter to the Dubbo League, queried a point in competition for the Astley Cup, for which a triangular contest between the Orange, Bathurst and Dubbo High Schools is arranged each year.

Orange requested the Dubbo League to interview Mr Astley, the donor of the cup, to ascertain what code was to be used.

At a meeting of the Dubbo League during the week it was pointed out that the code of football was decided by the majority of towns competing. Both Dubbo and Bathurst had agreed to adopt Union in preference to League.

Mr F. K. Bernasconi (secretary of the Orange Rugby League), in an interview with the "Leader", said that the cup was donated for the express purpose of fostering League football in the schools.

Although no course of action has been announced, it is understood that further investigations will be conducted by the Orange organisation.

Next meeting of the steering committee is Wednesday, 14th July, 5.30p.m. in the Music Centre.

### PANAIR

The team at PanAir are pleased to announce that the SEPTEMBER School Holiday learn to fly program enrolments are now open.

Students receive a Pilots logbook to enter their flight training details, they will have 3 hours of flight training in a training aircraft and additional time on the simulators with qualified instructors. Students will be introduced to aviation aerodynamics and the theory involved in flight training. There will be group site tours of our maintenance base where they will learn about aircraft maintenance from qualified aircraft engineers and have the opportunity to attend behind the scene airside airport tours and more.

Each student receives a certificate of completion at the end of the program and all flight training hours count towards a pilot licence hour requirement.

The target age group is Years 10-12.

Students under 18yrs parent/guardian approval required.

# E-Cigarettes What you need to know as parents.



If you, or a parent you know, is concerned about the risks of electronic cigarette use in teenagers, the following information provides you with the facts.

#### WHAT ARE E-CIGARETTES?

Also known as cuvies, stigs and vapes an e-cigarette is in simple terms a device that heats a flavoured liquid (popular flavours include; strawberry, watermelon, peach and creme brulee) to an aerosol which can be inhaled. The device can be disposable (often allowing for up to 600 inhalations) or it can be reusable by refilling the device with e-liquid or a pod (containing e-liquid). Recent data shows an increase in use of e-cigarettes over the past three years, with one in five students aged 16–17, trying e-cigarettes.

#### **HOW DO THEY WORK?**

E-cigarettes produce an aerosol by using a battery to heat a liquid. This liquid is sometimes called "e-juice," "e-liquid," "vape juice," or "vape liquid." The liquid used in e-cigarettes is made up of flavours, chemicals and often contains nicotine.

Users inhale e-cigarette aerosol into their lungs. Bystanders can also breathe in this aerosol when the user exhales it into the air.

#### WHAT DO THEY LOOK LIKE?

E-cigarettes come in a variety of shapes and sizes. They can be as small as a USB and even look like one, they can also look like pens, highlighters or cigarettes.



#### WHY ARE THEY UNSAFE/RISKY/DANGEROUS?

E-cigarette liquid is made up of different chemicals. These chemicals can include:

- Nicotine (although illegal without a prescription in Australia, many disposable devices that youth are using contain nicotine.)
- Flavorings such as diacetyl, a chemical linked to a serious lung disease
- Volatile organic compounds
- Cancer-causing chemicals
- Heavy metals such as nickel, tin, and lead

Studies have also shown that kids who use e-cigarettes are more likely than their peers to go on to smoke cigarettes.

#### Effects of nicotine on youth:

- Nicotine can harm the developing teenage brain.<sup>1</sup> The brain keeps developing until about age 25.
- Using nicotine as a teenager can harm the parts of the brain that control attention, learning, mood, and impulse control.<sup>1</sup>
- Each time a new memory is created or a new skill is learned, stronger connections or synapses are built between brain cells. Young people's brains build synapses faster than adult brains. Nicotine changes the way these synapses are formed.
- Using nicotine as a teenager may also increase risk for future addiction to other drugs.1

#### WHAT CAN I DO AS A PARENT?

The KEY is talking about e-cigarettes with your child, preparing yourself with the facts and role modelling with a smoke and e-cigarette free environment. KEY considerations for talking about e-cigarettes:

- K: Know the facts or where to find them from a reputable source
- E: Engage on the topic in a relaxed and easy way. Use the cues around you, a note home from the school, a person using a device, a story on the news as the way into the conversation and the way to keep talking about it ongoing.
- Y: You know your child, communicate with them in ways that work for you and allow you to provide them with the right information to make healthy decisions.

Important note - if you are concerned that your child may be experiencing nicotine withdrawal please speak to your pediatrician or doctor.
